



From the Principal

Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends,

Today we celebrate All Souls Day. We are thinking of everyone within our community who have lost a loved one. To those whom have passed, we send them our love and feel them at peace as we remember the joy that they brought to our lives. At this time we offer our condolences to Brother Kevin Blyth's family. Brother Kevin was a member of the Marist Community at Randwick and was Principal here for six years between 1984 and 1989. May he rest in peace.

Last Thursday and Friday I had the extraordinary privilege of attending the NSW Education Symposium: Future Directions for NSW schools. It included 270 teachers, School and System Leaders from all sectors of Education, both local and International Academics and the Minister for Education, Adrian Piccoli, MP. The purpose of the symposium was to engage in serious dialogue about current and future trends in education and industry, to identify what is working at a classroom and school level and to pose actions and ideas to the Minister to inform policy development for future reform directions in NSW. I look forward to continuing this discussion with our staff here at St Patrick's Marist.

Last week Year 9 had a fabulous time at camp. I thank Mr Berner for his organisation and I thank Mr Hornby, Mr Lower, Miss Carne, Miss Raffoul, Miss Lawrence, Mr Haddad, Mrs Van Zeeland and Mr O'Connell for giving up their time to be with the students on camp.

As we come to Term 4, I would like to reiterate the importance of school attendance. Earlier in the year, I shared some statistics about the significant impact to learning that even a 10% absence can have. Being absent from school can increase a student's level of anxiety. The more time away the harder it is to get back to school. Sometimes, building resilience in young people means having to make hard decisions and sticking to them, especially in relation to attending school. Recently, I was reading an article on how to help your children be more resilient. I thought I would share one strategy with you; "Helpful and Optimistic Thinking"

Resilience is about being realistic, thinking rationally, looking on the bright side, finding the positives, expecting things to go well and moving forward, even when things seem bad.

When your child is upset, you can help them keep things in perspective by focusing on facts and reality. For example, you could try gently asking, "Does this really matter as much as you think it does? On a scale from 1-10, how bad is it really?"

You can also help your child understand that a bad thing in one part of their life doesn't have to flow over into all parts. For example, if your child gets a poor exam result, you could point out that it won't stop him playing his weekend sport, or going out with his friends.

A sense of humour can help you both keep things in perspective and stay calm.

If your child is being hard on themselves – for example, "I'm going to die of embarrassment speaking in front of my class" – you could suggest more helpful self-talk instead. For example, your child could try saying, "Public speaking isn't my favourite thing, but I'll be able to cope."

Your child is more likely to feel positive if they can see that difficult times are a part of life, that they'll pass, and that things will get better. You might be able to help your child with this by talking about how you, people you know, or even famous people have gone through tough times.

HSC EXAMINATIONS

The HSC examinations have been taking place over the past few weeks and have run smoothly with students having an overall happy reaction to most papers. As the HSC draws to a close, many of our teachers begin the process of marking the HSC either online or at various marking centres. At St Patrick's Marist, teachers are encouraged to be part of HSC marking as a professional learning experience which informs teachers regarding approaches to:

- discovering what common mistakes students made in the 2016 Exam
- determine if school based marking is to the same level of difficulty as the HSC
- greater understanding of what the marking guidelines mean
- professional development learning new marking skills
- experience of the full range of responses from across the course candidature and contrasting different approaches to the examination
- opportunities to apply for positions such as pilot marker or senior marker in the marking operation, or as a judge in the standards-setting operation.

Many of our teaching staff having HSC marking expertise or experience as senior markers or other senior positions within the marking process reflects the deep passion they have in supporting our students to succeed in their senior HSC year.

2016 LITERACY PATR

The PATR results (Progressive Achievement Tests in Reading Comprehension) has reflected strong growth in all Years from 7 through to 10. The test is an online multiple choice examination which tests the student's skills in interpreting texts; reflecting on texts and interpreting explicit information. As part of the whole school approach to literacy, 'Thinking Note Keys' plays a major role in supporting student growth in reading comprehension. This strategy has clearly supported the students when annotating texts and to draw deeper meaning from them. The work of our teachers in engaging students each day when accessing various texts has built literacy skills and is reflected in the growth in PATR and also in NAPLAN. This work was driven by all staff but in particular I would like to acknowledge the hard work and planning of our Literacy Team; Mrs Loraine Pett (Leader of Learning - English), Ms Emily Gray (Assistant Leader of Learning - English); Mrs Claire Franke; Mr Paul Sheppard and Mrs Karen Martin.

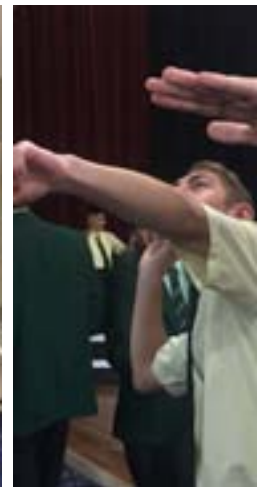

PAPER PLANES COMPETITION

Jackson and I had qualified into the University of Sydney rounds and so Jackson and I decided to embark on a journey that was like no other and this was all thanks to Miss Hagarty and Mr Elias for making this possible.

It was just another sunny Saturday morning. The birds were chirping, the sun was shining, peering through my shutters, demanding I arise from my comfortable slumber. What was different about this day was that I had a calling, and that calling was the pull of a day filled with paper planes.

MATHS AND SCIENCE DAY COMPETITION

On the 20th of October, twenty four Year 10 students participated in the Maths and Science Day Competition run by Miss Hagarty and Mr Makram.

The first session of the competition can honestly only be described as a blur. The twenty four of us sat amazed and confused as Mr Makram attempted to explain 'simple' harmonic motion calculus to us. After session one, we broke off into our colour coordinated groups and began the first task. This task focused on finding the amount of elastic bands needed to create a bungee cord to drop an egg 1.56 metres in a bag without cracking the egg. Unfortunately, each group only had 3 elastic bands to experiment with, making the challenge set for us all very difficult. Eventually the groups found the average distances and time taken to drop the egg with one, two and three elastic bands. This information was then transferred into the 'easy enough' simple harmonic motion to determine how many elastic bands were needed in the end. Different answers were produced across the board ranging from 7 to 11 but funnily enough the blue team had won the first challenge, having the correct answer of 11 elastic bands needed to drop the egg.

Task two focused on building a bridge purely out of plastic straws and hot glue. The aim of the task was simple enough. Whichever team held the most amount of weight on their bridge won. Blue were unable to secure the lead with the yellow team winning this task, withholding approximately 3 to 4kg of weight. Now that was seriously mind-boggling!

All in all, the Maths and Science Day Competition was a great success and students who participated definitely enjoyed the day, furthering our knowledge of the many mathematical and scientific problems most of us never knew existed. We learned that in order to be successful in our challenges we needed to put both our amazing Science and Maths skills to use together! On behalf of the Year 10 students, we would like to thank both Miss Hagarty and Mr Makram greatly for organising the competition and passing on their knowledge to the future St Patrick's Marist Mathematicians and Scientists.

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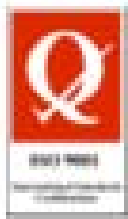
