READING FOR MEANING

While the mechanics of reading, such as recognising words and the sounds that go with them, are very important, they are really just stepping stones on the path to literacy. The ultimate goal of reading is to be able to understand the words on a page in a way that is relevant to the reader.

Last year staff took some time to not only explore the data from NAPLAN and also PATR tests but also to undertake aspects of the NAPALN test to better understand the expected levels of literacy for Year 7s and Year 9s.

The data identified that our students require a focused teaching approach to support them with reading for meaning.

Reading for Meaning is a research-based strategy that helps all readers build the skills that proficient readers use to make sense of challenging texts. Regular use of the strategy gives students the opportunity to practice and master the three phases of critical reading that lead to reading success, including

- · Previewing and predicting before reading.
- Actively searching for relevant information during reading.
- Reflecting on learning after reading.
- Reading for Meaning builds in all students the skills used by proficient readers to extract meaning from even the most rigorous texts from all subject areas.

THINKING NOTE KEYS

A key strategy for all teachers is Thinking Note Keys. This strategy used key texts used with the lesson to provide students with the skills of deeply understanding all aspects of the texts, both written and implied. This table displayed in each classroom may also be used at home to support your child in deepening their comprehension of a text.

Tier 2 consists of high frequency words that occur across a variety of domains. That is, these words occur often in mature language situations such as adult conversations and literature, and therefore strongly influence speaking and reading.

Tier 3 consists of low-frequency words that occur in specific domains. Domains include subjects in school, hobbies, occupations, geographic regions, technology, weather, etc. We usually learn these words when a specific need arises, such as learning amino acid during a chemistry lesson. Examples of Tier 3 words are: economics, isotope, asphalt, Revolutionary War, and, crepe.

It important to remember that Tier 2 and 3 words are not all clear-cut in their tier classification.

ENGLISH

Wordflyers Program

This year as part of their English program, all students in Years 7-10 will be completing activities on their iPad using a program the College has purchased called 'Wordflyers'. It is a literacy based program aimed at allowing students to focus, both in class and at home, on the following areas - vocabulary, punctuation, grammar, spelling, reading comprehension and writing. Over the past three weeks students have completed a placement test on their iPad that determines what level they should be working at for the tasks.

Each English teacher will be allocating set tasks each week for the students in their class to complete as part of their homework. Teachers are then able to monitor each child's progress and completion of the tasks. Students can see what percentage of the task they get correct and determine where they need to complete additional exercises to help improve in this area. Students are free to work ahead and complete as many of each task as they wish, aiming to progress to a higher level. It is also possible for students to revise skills from previous years.

The program operates with a travel theme, so students amass points for the questions they get correct and these points allow them to 'travel' to selected destinations around the world. They are then able to learn exciting things about this new destination.

Parents are encouraged to ask their child to show them the program. The information will be useful for parents in monitoring their child's strengths and weaknesses as well as their completion of this weekly homework task. It will be additional to other homework set by the teacher that may be connected to the topic or unit being studied in class. The program can be accessed via www.wordflyers.com.au. Library

One of the benefits of reading is an improved vocabulary. No matter how much we read we will always come across words that we do not know. Three tricks to improve your Grammar:

Vexatious. Irksome. Rebarbative.

You may not know all those words, but in a sentence, you get the idea. For instance, "I'm so tired of studying these vexatious lists of test vocabulary," should hint that the meaning of that first V-word is "troublesome."

Whether you're studying an English test or any other test where vocabulary is important, there are steps you can take to improve your understanding of unfamiliar words beyond just memorising long lists. Use these tips to up your vocab game:

1. Read, Read, Read

Are you a voracious reader who plows through a book each week? If so, you probably do pretty well on vocab-based exams. The more you read, the more words you learn through context.

However, don't think you can only build vocabulary skills through reading textbooks or classics. Books you read for fun will help too; so will news articles or magazines, especially on topics that are new to you. Better yet, your e-reader probably lets you click on a word to look it up; try that to boost your vocab. You might also consider trying an app like ProfessorWord—it automatically highlights ACT and SAT words on any webpage, and you can click on the word to see the definition. You can save the words you don't know to a list for reviewing later.

2. Practice Seeing the Big Picture

When it comes to figuring out words you don't know, context is key. Remember a few paragraphs ago where you read the word voracious? Maybe you knew that word, maybe you didn't. Either way, I'll bet you understood what it meant in that sentence. Why? The rest of the sentence makes clear that a "voracious" reader has a strong appetite for books.

That's an example of drawing meaning from context, and it's key to acing tests that draw on your knowledge of advanced vocabulary. Here is an example from the ACT's sample English questions that shows why context is important.

I grew up with buckets, shovels, and nets waiting by the back door; hip-waders hanging in the closet; tide table charts covering the refrigerator door; and a microscope was sitting on the kitchen table. Having studied, my mother is a marine biologist. Our household might have been described as uncooperative. Our meals weren't always served in the expected order of breakfast, lunch, and supper. Everything was subservient to the disposal of the tides. When the tide was low, Mom could be found down on the mudflats. When the tide was high, she would be standing on the inlet bridge with her plankton net.

The passage describes the writer's mother as a marine biologist who runs an unconventional household. It includes this sentence:

Everything was subservient to the disposal of the tides.

A question asks you to select the best alternative to the underlined portion of a sentence. The choices for this sentence are:

- A. NO CHANGE
- B. was defenceless in the face of
- C. depended on
- D. trusted in

Maybe you don't know the word subservient, but here's the context (aka the other sentences around it):

"Our meals weren't always served in the expected order of breakfast, lunch, and supper. Everything was subservient to the disposal of the tides. When the tide was low, Mom could be found down on the mudflats. When the tide was high, she would be standing on the inlet bridge with her plankton net."

This conveys that the mother works her family's schedule around her job. So in context, the best answer here is C—everything depended on the tides.

Practicing context comprehension will help you crack the code on these questions. You don't need to understand every word on its own; what's important is that you understand what the passage is trying to say.

3. Target the Toughest Words

Yes, you can make flashcards and review them obsessively, but there are always a few words that are harder to make stick—and for those, you may need to trick yourself more creatively.

Start by making a list of ten words that are giving you trouble. Put it in a spot where you'll see it a lot, and then focus on those words until you've got them down. Try saying them out loud and writing them out; both methods will help you retain them better than just going over them mentally.

For the ones that still won't stick, try a personal association. Here's an example: "Tangent" is defined as "going off the main subject." You probably know a person who does this a lot—say his name is Scott. Think of Scott on an island vacation; he's a "tan gent" rambling about random topics—get it? Now you have a word association that's personal and easier to remember. If you're a more visual person, you can do something similar by drawing a small picture that helps you remember a word's meaning.

Following these habits as a general rule, not just right before test time, should give you a good foundation for understanding vocabulary words and increase your chance of getting better test results.

Dear Parents

All Catholic schools in the Diocese of Parramatta will be once again participating in the Quality Catholic Schooling (QCS) survey.

The QCS survey provides information from students, staff and parents about our school's cultural behaviour, relationships and learning community, and assists us in our focus on continuous improvement.

Between 21 March and 1 April 2016 all staff and students and 60 randomly-selected parents will be asked to complete an online survey. Staff and students will complete the survey online at school. Selected parents will be sent home a paper survey but will also be able to complete the survey online if preferred. The survey will take about 20-30 minutes to complete.

This year we will again be able to get even more information about the link between student wellbeing and learning outcomes. To do this we will need to include a student identifier in the student survey. The survey will still remain confidential and individual survey responses will not be accessible by the school or the Catholic Education Office.

An independent survey consultant (Insight SRC) who manages the data collection will ensure the survey data is kept strictly confidential. Each school will receive a de-identified information report at the end of May to help them to develop strategies for further improvement. This will definitely help us in working with all students to improve their learning. If you have concerns, please feel free to contact Jason Scanlon.

As a parent if you are randomly-selected to complete the survey, I would encourage your participation as this will help our school to identify our strengths and areas in which we can focus our improvement.
