From the Principal

Dear Parents, Staff, Students and Friends,

This term has been jam packed with so many wonderful events and opportunities and I thank everyone here at the College for their hard work and commitment, and the many additional hours that our staff have contributed to ensure our students have the best possible experiences here at St Patrick's Marist. It has been great to see you at our Parent Meetings, our P&F Meeting, the P&F Cocktail Evening and our Working Bee. We will also be having a parent morning coffee get together on the 5th May. Drop the kids off and stop in for a lovely coffee made by our Hospitality - Food and Beverage students. I will send an invite at the start of next term with an RSVP.

Next week marks a most significant time for us as Christians as we remember the events and circumstances of Jesus' suffering, death and resurrection. During this week, as we make our final preparations of prayer, fasting and alms giving, we purposefully pause, taking time for deep reflection on our own lives and our response to Jesus' sacrifice. Our long journey to the font culminates in the three days that make up the Easter Triduum. These three days draw us into the mystery of our salvation. On Easter Sunday we celebrate with joy in what God has done for us in his Son Jesus Christ.

Easter is a seven week season of joy and grace. Starting with the Triduum in Holy Week, and ending with Pentecost Sunday. This 50 day season has been called "the radiant centre of the liturgical year." We keep celebrating so that we might continue to enter into the meaning of the resurrection and to deepen the way it touches our daily lives.

The Triduum provides some of the richest liturgical celebrations of the church year, which include the washing of feet on Holy Thursday, the veneration of the Cross on Good Friday and the lighting of the Easter fire and blessing of the Easter Candle on Holy Saturday to mention a few. I would encourage you as families to take part in these liturgical celebrations during the Easter Triduum.

REFLECTIONS FOR LENT

FIFTH SUNDAY OF LENT – 1-2 April

Jesus is getting near to Jerusalem — it's just over the hill. He has left the relative safety of his home in the Galilee to be with family and friends. He is late, they tell him. They ask him, why did you take so long? You could have saved Lazarus from dying!

Jesus, though, has another lesson for his disciples and followers. We are all 'Lazarus' and each of us is the one 'whom Jesus loved'. He comes to us and stands at the doorway of our lives and helps us to see that we need to be freed from the dark places in which we sometimes lose ourselves.

Jesus calls the friends of Lazarus to unbind him and set him free. Jesus calls on us to unbind those around us. We all need to be freed from the ties that bind us. We are at all times invited to give and receive the light and life of Christ's healing help and forgiveness.

This week Project Compassion calls us to help 'unbind' the issues for communities living in informal settlements around Fiji. Semiti, National Director of Caritas Australia's partner People's Community Network, addresses the sense of hopelessness in many of his people. He journeys with them as together they create new possibilities for better lives. Through our prayer, fasting and almsgiving, we can support this network of communities as they work in solidarity and grow in resilience and hope.

Aloma's Story - the Philippines

Love Your Neighbour

A victim of Typhoon Santi, Aloma was provided with the skills to lead her vulnerable community in developing resilience to extreme weather events.

When Typhoon Santi destroyed her home in coastal Philippines, Aloma feared for her family's safety and their future. Extreme weather events such as typhoons and cyclones are a common occurrence in this country, threatening the safety and food security of many families.

In the Philippines, GDP per capita is around one-tenth that of Australia's, and life expectancy is around 14 years lower. Poverty is the single most important factor determining vulnerability to natural disasters, which makes communities like Aloma's particularly vulnerable.

However, confidence began to replace fear for Aloma as she began participating in the Integrated Community Development Program (ICDP) in 2011. The program, run by the Socio Pastoral Action Center Foundation Inc., is supported by Caritas Australia. It helps communities to prepare for disasters, and adopt environmentally friendly practices.

Aloma's training in disaster risk reduction empowered her to take a leadership role in her community in caring for the environment. She manages logistics during natural disasters, and encourages the families in her village to plant mangroves for land conservation.

The program also offers guidance on working together for the common good. As a result, Aloma says, "All the skills that I learned, I pass on to friends and neighbours."

HISTORY

Ancient Egyptian Mummy Exhibition Powerhouse Museum

On the 22nd of March Year 11 and 12 Ancient and Extension History students had the privilege to come face to face with six ancient Egyptian Mummies, and learn more about the unique beliefs they had about life, death, and the afterlife. The six mummies displayed each had different characteristics. Three women, one being an enchantress (singer), another a priest, two men and a two year old boy. Through the advanced technology, virtually interactive 3D visualisations and extensive information given on the daily lives of Egyptians, students were able to unravel the past lives of each mummy while still in their original undisturbed condition. A lot of evidence had been collected by archaeologists and other scientists on the mummies; including the age of death, gender, what diet they might of had, state of health and the possible cause of death. Students saw through the 3D scan the enchantress, Tamut, from the Temple of Amun and Karnak. She was adorned with protective amulets on her neck, chest, stomach and feet. A fun aspect of the exhibition was an authentic mummy chamber. Students manoeuvred through a small crawl space, in the middle of the exhibition, decorated with hieroglyphics and Egyptian artwork, showcasing their language, religion and funerary practices. Visiting the exhibition was a rewarding experience, and on behalf of the entire Year 11 and 12 Ancient and Extension History cohort, we would like to thank the school for the opportunity.



High Needs Support Class

This Term, the students in the High Needs Support Needs Class have been working on independently reading a recipe and making scrambled eggs on toast. They have alternated making their breakfast in the classroom using the microwave to using the amazing facilities of the Food Technology rooms.

Each lesson involved the students getting out the ingredients and the utensils that the recipe calls for, and then following the recipe step by step to make scrambled eggs on toast. They cracked eggs, measured milk, grated cheese, sliced tomatoes and gathered basil from our garden and whisked it all together to make the yummiest smelling and tasting breakfast.

During this last week of school, we invited some of the staff to join us so the students could show off their culinary talents by making them breakfast. The students wrote the shopping list and organised the room to fit all the staff and themselves. Maroun greeted our guests when they arrived - shaking their hands and welcoming them to our cafe. Theresa offered everybody warm buttered toast she had made herself and Jess and Amanda helped to serve up the light and fluffy scrambled eggs that they had made.

On Wednesday the 15th April we experienced a visit from the Catholic Mission team, Luke and Dorothy, who were our presenters for the day and went through some fun activities that were held in the La Valla Centre. The reason why the Catholic Mission team came to us was because they had to explain what was happening in the world, such as the poor street kids and how desperate they are to find a welcoming warm home with the company of a family. They also highlighted our policy of non-bullying in our school and the things that people can do to stop bullying. They explained why human dignity matters and that it is such an important value in our lives.

The day was full of fun interacting activities that helped us to get an idea of what the Catholic Mission is and what we as a community can do to make a difference in the lives of others. What is NAPLAN?

The National Assessment Program – Literacy and Numeracy (NAPLAN) is an annual national assessment for all students in Years 3, 5, 7 and 9. All students in these year levels are expected to participate in tests in reading, writing, language conventions (spelling, grammar and punctuation) and numeracy. All government and non-government education authorities have contributed to the development of NAPLAN materials.

Why do students do NAPLAN tests?

NAPLAN is the measure through which governments, education authorities, schools, teachers and parents can determine whether or not young Australians are meeting important educational outcomes in literacy and numeracy. The tests provide parents and schools with an understanding of how individual students are performing at the time of the tests. They also provide schools, states and territories with information about how education programs are working and what areas need to be improved.

NAPLAN tests are one aspect of a school's assessment and reporting process; they do not replace the extensive ongoing assessments made by teachers about each student's performance.

What will be tested and how?

NAPLAN tests the sorts of skills that are essential for every child to progress through school and life, such as reading, writing, spelling, grammar and numeracy. NAPLAN content is aligned with the Australian Curriculum. For more information on this, please see the NAP website:

Questions are multiple-choice or require a short written response. The writing task requires students to write a text in response to a prompt.

To give you an idea of what the tests look like, sample questions and a sample writing task are available on the NAP website.

Who will run the tests?

NAPLAN tests are conducted at schools and administered by classroom teachers, school deputies or principals. Each state and territory is responsible for marking the tests in accordance with strict guidelines and processes.

How can I help my child prepare for the tests?

NAPLAN assesses literacy and numeracy skills that students have already been learning through the school curriculum. Teachers will ensure students are familiar with the test formats and will provide appropriate support and guidance.

Help your child prepare for NAPLAN by reassuring them that NAPLAN tests are just one part of their school program, and reminding them on the day to simply try their best. The use of services by coaching providers is not recommended.

If you have any questions about your child's preparation for NAPLAN, you should make a time to speak with their teacher.

What additional support can schools provide for students with special needs?

All students are encouraged to participate in NAPLAN tests. Students with disability may qualify for adjustments that reflect the support normally provided in the classroom. Students who have a temporary injury may also be reasonably accommodated.

A formal exemption may be granted for a student with significant intellectual disability and/or significant coexisting conditions, or for a student who has recently arrived in Australia and has a non-English speaking background.

Your school principal and your state testing authority can give you more information on special provisions or the process required to gain a formal exemption.

How is NAPLAN performance measured?

NAPLAN is not a pass-or-fail type test. Individual student performance is shown on a national achievement scale for each test. Each test scale has 10 bands and all year levels are reported on the same scale. Six bands are reported for each year level for each test. One of these bands represents the national minimum standard for students at each year level. A result at the national minimum standard indicates that the student demonstrated the basic literacy and numeracy skills needed to participate fully in that year level. The performance of individual students can be compared to the average performance of all students in Australia.

What happens if my child is absent from school on test days?

Where possible, schools will organise for individual students who are absent at the time of testing to complete missed tests at another time during the testing week. Individual students are not permitted to sit tests after Friday 12 May 2017.

Will I receive a report on my child's performance?

A NAPLAN report will be issued by your school later in the year. The same report format is used for every student in Australia. The school will notify you when the reports are being sent to you. If you do not receive a report, you should contact the school. Individual student results are strictly confidential.

How are NAPLAN test results used?

- Schools use results to identify strengths and weaknesses in teaching programs and to set goals in literacy and numeracy.
- School systems use results to review programs and support offered to schools.
- Students and parents may use individual results to discuss progress with teachers.
- Teachers use results to help them better identify students who require greater challenges or additional support.

- Calculators are **not** permitted in the numeracy test in Years 3 and 5. In Years 7 and 9, each student will sit one numeracy test. This test will have two parts: one where calculator use is permitted and one where it is not.


