As a parent, you've probably heard that St Patrick's Marist at Dundas is focusing upon inquiry learning as a key expression of our Vision for Learning. Inquiry learning encompasses PBL (Problem Based Learning), Flipped Classroom and more. Our transformation to an inquiry learning model is driven by ensuring our moral obligation to form young Marist graduates equipped to experience success in an ever-changing world.

Let us focus on Project-based learning (PBL). It is a practice that takes a learning-by-doing approach wherein students are active participants in their own learning. In a PBL classroom, you often find students solving problems, participating in simulations, conducting case studies and designing research projects based on different areas of inquiry. This method encourages students to investigate real world issues and develop practical solutions in order to inspire change at the local and global levels.

St Patrick's Marist College like so many schools in the CEDP have embraced this method mainly because it cultivates the curiosity of students. And why is that important? For starters, psychologists have found that "curious people report finding a greater sense of meaning in life." Secondly, research shows that curious, intrinsically-motivated students become deep learners who master complex subjects, and who develop a sense of "fascination with the subject, a sense of its relevance to life and the world, a sense of accomplishment in mastering it, and a sense of calling to it."

Since project-based learning isn't quite yet the standard in every classroom, many misconceptions about the practice still abound. In our next parent forum, we will explore PBL, its structure and learning outcomes. We will also display the new building works which will reflect inquiry learning as the norm.


YEAR 7

Year 9 History Elective Excursion - Justice and Police Museum

Last Wednesday, Ms Maish's Year 9 History Elective class went on an excursion to Circular Quay to explore the fascinating archaeological site called the 'Big Dig'. We also visited the old and precious 'Justice and Police Museum' in which we revised our Semester 1 topic of 'Murders, Mysteries and Assassinations' in studying the famous story of the Pyjama Girl case! We watched the first film made about it, analysed the film and then afterwards visited the two sections of the museum holding valuable archeological items such as guns and knives that criminals used. To make it more exciting, we saw the preservation coffin that they kept the Pyjama Girl in to preserve her body throughout the length of the case and her face mask to identify her, made in 1939! After we visited all of that, our class performed a mock trial of Pyjama Girl's husband at the time, 'Tony Agostini' was involved in. After the wonderful time we had at the Justice and Police Museum, we visited the archaeological site 'The Big Dig' where we explored many artefacts that were found there from our convict past and were told many stories about the site. Overall I thoroughly enjoyed the experience and recommend it to other History Elective classes in the future!

The Justice and Police Museum was a significant experience as it dove into the investigation of the 'Pyjama Girl' case study. The curiosity circulated the room as our class discussed theories on who murdered the unidentified girl. Who was she? Who killed her? We had so many burning questions with such little time for an answer! But finally, they were answered as we explored the different rooms of the museum. One room contained the actual zinc tub the Pyjama Girl was kept in over the years for preservation. We soon learned that the Pyjama Girl was Linda Agostini and it was her husband that murdered her in cold blood which we learned from a reenactment of the trial held in court. The second

half of our excursion was aimed at archaeology and how it can help us understand the past. We went to an area in the Rocks known for its historical past. It was previously an area of the Rocks home to convicts. There were so many spots where the convict's stories can still be remembered. There were even families dying from the plague from just how dirty and unhygienic the area was. We also got to handle various different artefacts that related to those convict stories, and try and come to our own conclusions about what the artefacts were used for. It was amazing to grow our understanding of the past both in history and archaeology.

"The Big Dig" archaeological excavation site is home to the remains of 19th century residences and commercial buildings, where we learnt about the difficult lives of convicts and free settlers who lived in the early colony. Year 10 History Elective Excursion - Jewish Museum

On the 8th of August, 2018, the Year 10 History Elective class had the legendary opportunity to visit the Jewish Museum located at Darlinghurst.

Upon entering the museum, our class was escorted into a room where we met 98-year old Holocaust survivor, Eddie Jaku, who talked to us about his life story. During Eddie's speech about his past, he shared with us his personal stories about escaping the multiple concentration camps that Eddie was placed in during World War Two. He talked about how his plans of escaping, the brutality he faced when Germans were taking over his home, and how he had to experience losing many family members, including his beloved family dog, who were taken from him by the Nazis. From his speech, he taught us many life lessons about the importance of friendship and family and how valuable they are to our lives. He quoted, "nous sommes tous dans le même bateau" which translates from French that "we're all in this together". Despite his negative past, he continued to display immense bravery and love for others, mentioning multiple times that hate is a disease and no one should hate others. We were mesmerised about his positivity after life events that were indeed difficult, and his ability to keep trying for freedom. We were amazed by how happy he was after his past and how willingly he told his story to spread the message about the horrors of World War Two.

After Eddie's motivational speech, our class was split into two groups and we had the chance to explore the museum exhibits with tour guides. These exhibits enabled us to examine artefacts from World War Two up close and hear further about the stories of survivors. What really touched everyone's hearts was the memorial in honour of the 1.1 million children whose lives were taken in the Holocaust. One of the walls was lined with photographs and names of the children who had passed along with a bowl filled with 1.1 million drops of water. This bowl represented the tears of not only the children who were slaughtered, but their families and friends, one water drop in the bowl for each child who died.

Following the conclusion of the tour, we participated in an interesting seminar about how Hitler rose to power in 1933 and the society of Nazi Germany as well as propaganda, that assisted in the manipulation and persuasion during and before World War Two.

Overall, it was an extremely insightful experience that allowed us to learn in more detail about how the Holocaust played a significant role in shaping World History and it's great influence on the lives of many. Our class highly recommends a visit to the Jewish Museum if you want to gain a deeper understanding of a terrible and significant event that changed the world. We would like to give a special thanks to our school Principal Ms Hay and the College for giving us the privilege to travel there.



YEAR11EARTHANDENVIRONMENTAL SCIENCE

Taronga Zoo Excursion

Year 11 Earth and Environment Science class went on an excursion to Taronga Zoo. The excursion is an important part of the Depth Study and the requirement for the HSC course learning about the environmental impacts of people on water. The class had to analyse the various steps of the water treatment plant, as well as meet awesome animals like Murray the snake (he was a long carpet python). At Taronga Zoo, we inspected the scenes of what goes on when water is used to wash animal cages, labelled taps used for drinking water for the public. Nearly 500kL of water is used every day at Taronga

Zoo and is recycled and cleaned so that it may be used again to wash exhibits. The water is cleared of any bacteria then is discharged in the harbour not affecting the environment and the organisms that are present in the Sydney Harbour. Our trip to Taronga Zoo was educational and informative and helped us to understand the complex process of water treatment and appreciate the steps that scientist undertake to keep water clean


VISUAL ARTS



Dear Parents/Guardians

As part of a scheduled review of the Public Health Act 2010, the provisions relating to immunisation in schools have been amended in order to manage disease outbreaks in schools and the community. Schools are now required to ensure that all parents provide an approved immunisation certificate that shows their child's immunisation status, including

- is fully immunised for their age, or
- Is not fully immunised for their age, or
- · Has a medical reason not to be vaccinated, or
- Is on a recognised catch-up schedule if the child has fallen behind with their immunisations.

If an approved immunisation certificate is not provided, these children will be classified as unimmunised and may be excluded from school if there is an outbreak of a vaccine-preventable disease at the school.

We are therefore asking that a copy of your child's immunisation history statement (as per attached) is returned to the College via their homeroom by 24th September. Copies of immunisation history statement can be obtained by:



Scenario 3 - AIR Immunisation History Statement - Medical contraindications or natural immunity

Parents/guardians of children who have a medical condition that prevents them from being immunised, or who have natural immunity to a vaccine preventable disease, should attend their GP or medical specialist to have an AIR Immunisation Medical Exemption Form completed, signed and sent to the AIR. Parents/guardians should then access an updated AIR Immunisation History Statement that records the medical contraindication/natural immunity and provide it to the school for enrolment.
