

From the Principal Leader

We are now into our 7th week of remote learning and we are all finding it somewhat challenging, for many reasons. Last Monday teams met to talk about different ways that we can work to engage students. I believe the lack of certainty about a return date to school, the increasing numbers and the lack of connection with families, friends, colleagues and school mates has many of us feeling a little flat. Our staff and student leaders continue to provide many fun opportunities to engage and connect and this has been extremely successful with our younger students, and to a lesser extent our older students. The need for routine in our current situation continues to be very important.

Getting up, getting dressed for school and coming to homeroom each morning is absolutely essential. Joining in every lesson, the same. I am hearing that a small number of students who haven't submitted work are avoiding the next classes because they are worried about getting into trouble. If this happens in your family, please let us know, we understand that students work at different speeds. We are working with teachers to adjust their message and look at when work needs to be submitted.

We continue to encourage students to spend time outside, and take a break away from their digital devices and the TV screen.

It is important to note that in normal circumstances we would expect Year 11 to be doing a minimum of 2 hours of work/study above their normal school day and it is important to remember that they continue to complete their preliminary course in preparation for their HSC. I would still expect that students are fully committed to and completing all necessary work, and to recognise that they will still complete a final assessment block in Term 4.

If you feel your child/ren are excelling and feel that they need to be extended, or conversely require some additional support, please contact their relevant teachers or their Pastoral Leader of Learning.

Our Year 12 students are at the end of the first week of their Assessment period, with assessments being held in a remote environment. The staff have spent considerable time working through everything to ensure we provide the best online environment and the students have been working hard.

Subject Selections 2022

We continue to prepare for next term and for 2022, with subject selections for Year 11 and Year 9 and I thank the KLA Leaders of Learning: Ms Hagarty, Ms Basha and Mr Quigley for their work and support through this process. As always, we try to give students their first choices, however it will depend on the combinations that students choose, as well as the number of students that select the course.

Representative Sport 2022

This week we received the news that we will no longer be part of the MCS and MCCS competitions. From 2022, there will be changes to how Catholic Education Diocese of Parramatta (CEDP) schools will access inter-school and representative sport. This will result in better and more equitable access to high quality sports, sporting competitions and pathways to representative sport for all students.

From the beginning of next year, this will happen only through the Parramatta Diocese Catholic Primary School Sports Council and/or the Parramatta Diocese Secondary Schools Sports Council. All other Catholic systemic schools in NSW will be using the same representative sports pathways. This means that we will no longer be part of the MCS andMCCS competitions, which have been a core part of our sporting history. I will send a letter with additional information to all families and students.

Our College Song "Sub Tuum Praesidium", is an ancient prayer that has been in the liturgy of the Church since at least the third century, it is the oldest known Marian prayer. It was a regular part of the prayer life of the Marist Brothers, and, sung in Latin, figured predominately in devotions involving Brothers in formation. As we continue to journey through this time together, I encourage our community to continue to pray to Mary our Good Mother. I have included Sub Tuum Praesidium in both English and Latin as well as a Prayer by Pope Francis.

Beloved Mother, help us realize that we are all members of one great family and to recognise the bond that unites us, so that, in a spirit of fraternity and solidarity, we can help to alleviate countless situations of poverty and need. Make us strong in faith, persevering in service, constant in prayer.

Mary, Consolation of the afflicted, embrace all your children in distress and pray that God will stretch out his all-powerful hand and free us from this terrible pandemic, so that life can serenely resume its normal course.

Just recently we have celebrated two significant dates in our Church Calendar. We celebrated Mary the Mother of Jesus and the Mother of God through the feast of the Assumption. Mary within our Marist family and tradition is central. For Marcellin, Mary was a focus of prayer and inspiration. As Marists today we seek to walk in the way of Mary, living lives that are faithful to God and others just as our College Motto reminds us.

As a woman of faith, Mary exemplifies the qualities of courage, faith and total trust in God as she followed her Son through the valleys of Galilee to Jerusalem where she stood by the Cross till her Son breathed his last. Mary waited with the apostles and saw her risen Son and received the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. The Feast of the Assumption of Mary recalls that at her death Mary was taken to Heaven in body and spirit. Let us like Mary listen closely to God's call and follow with courage and faith.



An Australian Pioneer: St Mary of the Cross MacKillop followed her own way - God's way

t all began in a stable, didn't it?
- and yet the journey ahead was far from stable.

It began in a far outpost of an empire and it went all the way to Rome. It involved rejection by religious authorities, conflict with an allegedly dispassionate secular government, betrayal by those who should have stayed closest, physical suffering – complete sacrifice.

Involved were believers, but also unexpected alliances – with non-believers, and between male and female, rich and poor. Sometimes it confounded the wise, while it made complete sense to little children. It was revolutionary by being orthodox, far-reaching by being so powerfully centred, hated because it was born of love.

Mary MacKillop's mission
demonstrated the truth of what St
Paul had said: '...suffering produces
perseverance, perseverance
character; and character, hope'
(Romans 5: 3 - 4). While her religious
vision of centralised administration
of far-flung communities on an
enormous continent prefigured
Australia's later political federation, it
was nothing new in the church - but

ironically was reviled by some church leaders who feared losing local control.

Saints are the bane of mere managers. Saints see more, intend greater, out-think habit. It was Mary's gift to be ahead of the game, and pride hates the taste of dust stirred in the wake of champions. Mary saw with unforced clarity the need for a single guiding hand across the continent. She pursued that simple requirement in the face of bishop after bishop who called for allegiance to the limits of just one diocese. She pursued it all the way to Rome, because Popes, like monarchs, feel less threatened by the little people than by the sometimes resentful aristocracy higher up the institutional ladder.

But Mary was that rare thing – not only an idealist, but a practising one.

She got her way – God's way – but at the expense of her closest ally; when she acceded to the practical notion that her order of Josephite sisters needed to own their own property rather than be forever at the mercy of those willing to lend them a home, Father Julian Tenison-Woods disowned her. Father Woods, who had nurtured Mary's idealism from the outset, had a radical vision of total poverty – no possessions.

But Mary was that rare thing – not only an idealist, but a practising one: possession was not compromise when it brought the greatest benefit to the neediest. This quality explains why, by the end of her Earthly life in 1909, 600 Josephite sisters in 106 communities were serving 1000 children and adults in orphanages and other charitable institutions, and 12,400 children in 117 schools (figures courtesy www.sosj.org. au) spread throughout Australia and New Zealand.

It is chiefly for her foundational work in education that St Mary of the Cross is remembered but, as someone who endured the most painful defamatory claims, constant harassment by authorities, and even excommunication by her own church, martyrdom would not seem an inappropriate badge of honour – if she ever had cared for mere honours.

The well-known 'Catholiphobe' Sir Henry Parkes inadvertently affirmed the power of Mary's life work when he reportedly said, The Sisters of St Joseph are like white ants; when once they enter a locality, you cannot even starve them out!' (Sr Monica Cavanagh, Address, 'Who will speak if you don't?' www.sosj.org.au). In opposition to Parkes' bigotry, it was the stern view of the contemporary Catholic bishops that without education in faith, there is no education at all which was Mary's greatest ally in spreading education to the poor through those white ants' in brown habits - even as some of the same bishops sternly disapproved of her way of doing things.

Time proves sainthood, but saintliness, with all its inconvenient unconventionality, is as instantly recognisable as Uluru.

- Caleb Bonora, Tiana Fernandes, Annalies Marsh, Erene D Souza, Bianca Tandean who received a Credit (more than 500 points)



Mr. Armitage ran a guessing competition to correctly identify a native Australian bush tucker plant growing in his garden. 

Junior SRC


Two important dates that the Junior SRC are concentrating on are:

Visual Arts students in Year 10 have recently completed their "Landscape and Sensation" unit.


Students used a variety of styles, techniques, and media both 2D and Digital to create these engaging Landscape works.



Cost excursions/incursions/camps/retreats within 2021 School Fees

Most excursions, incursions and pastoral activities that were planned up to the end of term 2 went ahead. Whilst we are unsure what will happen in the remainder of the year, excursions/incursions/pastoral activities that were planned for terms 3 & 4 have been either cancelled or postponed. We are still considering how KLA critical ones can be run.

I am in the process of reviewing all excursions incursions and pastoral activities:

- Any that are completely cancelled will be calculated and adjustments processed into school fees in time for the term 4 information statements. If you have completely paid your school fees for the year, the credit can remain and carry forward to 2022 or you can request it the be refunded to you. Please liaise with my School Fees Officer Mrs Wadih on 8841 7955.
- If any excursions or incursions that are postponed at this stage, but which do not go ahead by the end of the year, will be either run in 2022 or the costs will be adjusted from 2022 school fees.
- The Yr9 camp and Yr11 retreat have been postponed to 2022. These will not be refunded, as students will attend in 2022 and the cost will not be charged in 2022 school fees.

The adjustment for cancelled excursions, incursions and pastoral activities will be reflected by reversing the Term 3 Resource Fee and charging the new reduced Term 3 Resource Fee.

For example:

- Term 3 Resource Fee -\$600 (ie reversal of term 3)
- Term 3 Resource Fee \$450 (ie new charge for term 3 to reflect reduction of \$150)

A bit of other catch-up news:

Cleaning & COVID cleaning

During the July school holidays, our cleaners competed their full school normal end-of-term cleaning including cleaning all classrooms, offices, etc. This term they are only cleaning (and touchpoint sanitising) the areas that are being used by staff and the few students who are coming to school. Whenever, Yr12 students need to come in to deal with their HSC major works, those areas are cleaned and sanitised that evening.

We have also placed QR codes around the school for staff, students and for any emergency tradespeople to use to check in.

We have topped up supplies of:

- Sanitiser in every classroom/office/other student/staff area, sanitising alcohol wipes for musical instruments and for other shared laptops or equipment. Science labs have sinks with hand soap.
- Sanitisation stations inside the main reception and Wiyanga's reception as well as in the junior breezeway and in the main courtyard
- Social distancing signs and additional posters
- Gloves, masks, etc as required.

Maintenance & grounds at the school

During the July school holidays, in anticipation of students returning to school in term 3, our usual tradespeople completed their routine servicing and required repairs e.g. electrical, plumbing, air con, pest spray, locksmith, window/bi-fold doors, TAS equipment, painting, etc; and the builders of A block sent their trades to fix items (still within warranty period).

A major job that was performed was the total replacement of the school's old PA system! New internal and external speakers, a significant amount of cabling, and a new central unit was installed. This gave us an opportunity to re-locate speakers given the expansion of the school.

Other urgent work done - replacing bus bay gates motors; gyprocking; concreting new pathway; handrails; damaged TVs replaced in A block; vinyl flooring repaired in labs; waterproofing; etc.

The decommissioning of the demountables at the back of the school (C127, C128 & C129) started.

Our regular grounds work continues to ensure that it does not get out-ofcontrol.

Our maintenance team continue to work onsite, as their work is essential and cannot be done from home. They are working hard fixing other maintenance items as well as tasks such as pressure washing and assisting our WHS Officer with regular WHS site inspections.




